Now I've started doing it, but I don't know if I'm doing it right. The thing is, that I've created a fork (on Bitbucket) from the master branch, with a branch name of "bar". Now I've worked for a while on my own branch and there was a conflict. I've worked on my branch until I got a error that my branch was no longer up-to-date. But I've got the master branch up-to-date with the branch where I've created the forked branch. Now I'm getting a weird situation, where I've deleted the branch from Bitbucket, then I've created the same branch name "bar" on Bitbucket, and have made some work. But when I now want to merge my "bar" branch to the master branch, it says that my "bar" branch is ahead of the master branch (in fact it's behind, but the "master branch" on Bitbucket is behind the "bar branch" in my local machine). Now I'm wondering what's the correct way to do this? A: You can pull the branch you are working on into the master branch and make sure you have no merge conflicts (git status) before you merge. When it says that your branch is ahead of master it means you have made some changes that are not in the master branch yet. The reason you are seeing this is because your local branch, "bar", is ahead of the master branch.
